## A "Screenplay" Comes to Life

Before Zotfilm surfaced at UC Irvine, film and drama majors were limited to theory-based academics that gave them the itch to produce films. Film majors wanted to direct and shoot, and drama majors want-

ed to act and be seen.

Zotfilm, part of UC Irvine's Film-Arts-Drama Alliance, brings film and drama students together to practice their craft and take a handson approach to what they learn in

Teams of 20 members work on their projects over the course of eight weeks to create short films that premiere at the end of the quar-

Third-year film and media studies major Yoshi LeaVesseur and fourth-year film and media studies and international studies double maior Nicolas Plottier met as producer and writer in their first Zotfilm group in fall quarter 2012. That would be the beginning of a successful partnership, which has already generated two student films: a Zotfilm, "Shuffle," and an independent film of their own, called

"Zotfilm taught me that filmmaking is a lot more complex than I thought, with a lot more moving eces," Plottier said.

The passion for creating these noving stories made it easy for eur and Plottier, along with their Zotfilm team to pull all-nighters and fall asleen in lecture just to get the film finished by the 8-week deadline. Once they finished "Shuffle" though the result was worth all the sleepless nights and 3 a.m. cram

ing to her iPod playlist. With each change in song, her entire environment changes and she seems to be alone, living out her songs in vibrant scenes that travel over the decades and across genres.

"I had written and created films before, but with Zotfilm I have been able to collaborate with multiple creative minds to write a single script," Plottier said. "It is amazing to see all the steps needed to create a short film, from pre-production to

For a month, the crew filmed each weekend from dawn 'til dusk, because Aldrich Park was only empty on weekends without weekday student traffic.

The rich coal deposits at Bergwerk Prosper-Haniel mines in Germany's Ruhr Valley are what lurk beneath the industrial towers shown in many of Bernd and Hilla Becher's classic Minimalist photographs from the late 1960s and '70s. For his most recent series of photographs, Miles Coolidge went down into those mine shafts. Four large, luxurious inkjet prints of the coal seams are at ACME. Gallery.

At first the images are difficult to make out, the sooty blackness yielding a velvety surface flecked with spots of white. As the coal seam slowly comes into view, with its fractured layers of carbonized vegetable matter transformed by intense pressure into potentially combustible fuel, an image deep within the Earth seems to fuse with the exquisite


