Winter SOC – LIVE | Winter Music Courses | Winter Course on Improvisation (MUS 181)

Music 181: Improvisation again next quarter. Please see Professor Dessen's course information below:

MUS 181 Improvisation is a 4-unit course for undergraduate Music Majors in the "Music and Culture" electives category. This winter, I will teach it in a way that accommodates all Music Majors interested in exploring this topic, regardless of their prior experience or specialization. There will be two types of coursework: 1) performance-based assignments requiring weekly practice outside of class, both individually and in small groups; and 2) assignments involving reading, listening, research and in-class presentations, including the option for students to design projects based on their interests. We will create a welcoming and collaborative class environment, supporting students with no prior improvisation experience while also enabling others (such as jazz majors) to study areas new to them. Assignments, presentations and discussions will expose students to diverse topics and traditions, and we will also explore "open" improvisational approaches that allow for an ensemble of musicians from different backgrounds to create music collectively in real time. Class time will be used for both presentations/discussions and performance practice, and the weekly workload will be comparable to a standard four-unit Music and Culture seminar. Enrollment will be limited to 15 students.
